The first candle is turned on every night along with a brief prayer. The second Sunday, a few days before the birth of Christ, the final purple candle is turned on. In the medieval advent it was a period of fasting during which the thoughts of the people were directed to the second expected coming of Christ; But in modern times many have forgotten this meaning and it was instead seen mainly as lead up to Christmas, and in that context the advent crown acts as a reminder of the party's approach. In 1964, a wreath of Advent, built at home from Wire Coathanger and Tinsel, appeared on the Bi-Weekly Blue Peter's television program. This "doing" has become one of the most iconic programs, repeated every year and has been the introduction of this tradition to most of the concern for fire.
