Add the onion, pepper and chorizo to the pan and fry over medium heat for 5-10min until the onion is golden and soft and the chorizo brown on the edges. Mix in garlic and paprika and cook for 1min. Return the potted chicken with tomatoes, rice (the key is to use Spanish paella rice, but if you can't find it, use a risotto, which has a round grain) and 750mle (11 pints) boiling water. Bring to a simmer, cover tightly and bake for 5 minutes until all the liquid has been absorbed and the rice is just tender. Mix in prawns and peas; cover and bake for 5 minutes until heat through. Condition, topping, then serve immediately with lemon wedges to squeeze over.
